






The Darcy Book Club

Darcy Book Club meets every third Thursday of the month at 1:30 p.m. at the Darcy Library. Books have been chosen in advanced by the current members and are available through the library.

Some of the current books the Book Club has enjoyed discussing are Invisible Women: Data Bias in a World Designed by Men by Caroline Criado Perez. As the title indicates, this award-winning nonfiction read argues that products, services and most everything created has been inadvertently designed with male biases to the detriment of female users. For example, from drug tests to automobile safety testing, females have not been considered in the testing and outcomes. Thus, this gender gap has had and continues to have serious impact on the lives of women in all areas from politics, industry to local services. It was a wakeup call and a lively discussion.

Our April book was *The Girls in the Stilt House, a debut novel by Kelly Mastian*. If you enjoyed Where the Crawdads Sing, then you will like this one. It is set in Mississippi in the 1920's and focuses on two young women, one white and one African American, who must overcome extreme loss and persevere. Their growth and strength is a key part of the novel as they deal with personal and societal difficulties. The writing is impressive and takes the reader into a world as dense as the struggles these two have to overcome. It was a big hit with the Book Club.



Remembering Your Story

Sometimes as we sit around a fire or dining table with friends and family, we start to tell 'stories'. A researcher of history recently commented, "It was amazing, as soon as their stories started to be told, they came alive." The importance of sharing our stories is that we all have them AND if we don't write them down, they are lost to our families when we are gone.

Pat Sheafor has led a number of series using Richard Morgan's *Remembering Your Story*. This book and its process, involves a 10 week series of gatherings or one can do it by oneself with a commitment to the process and time in both circumstances.

Another process is that of *StoryWorth*, a commercial venture through the internet. Pat recently completed an almost two year process using their program - with the result that she has written *Third Culture Kid - Memories to share with her* extended family who now have the book and photos to keep these stories alive.

Not too scholarly, not too scary, fun to compose and remember.

Come to the Darcy Library on August 21st from 3 to 4 p.m. for an hour of descriptions of two possible ways to get started on YOUR story. Pat will share her experience with these possible, friendly ways to write your stories - as short or as long as you wish to make them, as detailed, serious, and funny as you want them to be.

Volunteer News – Spring 2023

Between April 1, 2022 and March 31, 2023, two in-house volunteers provided 689 hours of service in and on behalf of the library. Carol and Denny McAnulty contributed 486 hours in computer repair and maintenance and Denny's "Read to Denny" program. The Board and Friends of the Library provided 245 hours in planning for library maintenance and operations and fundraiser events. This brings our total documented hours of service to 1415.

They provide the many undocumented hours that are generously given by members of the community-atlarge in assisting with and supporting library events, programs and activities on an as-needed basis.
